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**Mafia Hit Man Lists Who's Who in Crime**

Mafia hit man-turned-informer Charles Allen has named at least 22 individuals as his partners in crime. Following are capsule descriptions of some in the cast of characters:

- Charles H. Allen, also known as Charles Palermo, the 47-year-old hit man whose undercover work for the FBI and other agencies has resulted in 50 tapes of conversations with reputed Mafia figures. Allen worked as a hit man for at least three major East Coast organized crime families and has admitted to several murders, arsons, bombings and assaults at their direction.
- Angelo Bruno, reputed head of the Philadelphia organized crime family. Allen's tapes reveal the family is split and headed for a war.
- Raymond A. (Long John) Martorano, said to be one of Bruno's top lieutenants. He allegedly placed an order in October for ten .22-caliber automatic revolvers to be used in a war between Bruno factions.
- Ralph Natale, the 47-year-old business agent for South Jersey Bartenders Local 170, who was convicted last month of conspiring to set fire to the Mr. Living Room furniture store in Marlton, N.J. Natale was arrested last week in a \$1-million Florida drug bust. He also is an alleged member of the Bruno family and reports to Martorano.
- Philip Testa, said to be a top lieutenant in the Bruno family and reportedly head of the rival faction. At one time, Testa was described as Bruno's heir apparent.
- Frank Sindone, reputedly Bruno's "vice president" in charge of loansharking and the owner of Frank's Cabana Steaks at 10th St. and Moyamensing Ave., called the "nerve center" for loansharking and numbers activity in the city. Sindone reportedly is aligned with Bruno and Martorano against Testa.
- Russell Bufalino, aging head of the Northeastern Pennsylvania mob and allegedly one of the top organized crime figures in the country. Bufalino, who reportedly ordered the 1975 murder of former Teamsters Union President Jimmy Hoffa, is now in prison after dodging numerous attempts by the U.S. Government to deport him to Italy.
- Frank Sheeran, president of Wilmington, Del., Teamsters Local 326, who allegedly works for the Bufalino organized crime family. Sheeran, a major suspect in the Hoffa case, allegedly has ordered or participated in several murders, arsons, bombings and assaults over the years.
- Anthony (Tony Pro) Provenzano, a high-ranking figure in the old Vito Genovese organized crime family and one of the most powerful Teamster officials in the country. Provenzano, one of the prime suspects in the Hoffa case, is serving a life sentence for the 1961 murder of a union foe.
- Nunzio and Sam Provenzano, Anthony's brothers, who control several North Jersey Teamster locals.
- Eugene Boffa, a convicted bank swindler and New Jersey businessman who reportedly has close ties to Bufalino and the Provenzanos. He and Sheeran are currently being probed for labor racketeering, and arranging "sweetheart" labor contracts.
- Francis McDonnell, convicted along with Natale of conspiracy in the Mr. Living Room arson case. Several of Allen's taped conversations are with McDonnell.
- Vincent Fardella, convicted in the Mr. Living Room case and described at the trial last year as an "expert arsonist."
- Louis (Buttons) Bottone, former president of Philadelphia Teamsters Local 107 who, along with Sheeran, allegedly ordered Allen to murder former Local 107 member Robert (Big Bobby) Marino on Feb. 3, 1976.
- Charles Hogan, a hood whose duties as a drug hauler earns him the title of "mule."
- Thomas Barker, a former member of Wilmington Teamsters Local 326, indicted but not convicted in the 1973 murder of Fred Gawronski at a New Castle, Del., tavern. Gawronski's death allegedly was ordered by Frank Sheeran. Barker, currently serving a 22-year prison sentence for burglary, testified before a 1977 Detroit grand jury probing Jimmy Hoffa's disappearance.
- David Osticcio, a member of the Russell Bufalino organized crime family who allegedly arranged the delivery of 15 sticks of dynamite and blasting caps to Sheeran and Allen. Sheeran allegedly was going to use the dynamite to blow up buildings in Wilmington and Philadelphia.

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
